HYPOXIA: EXCERPTS FROM SAFETY ALERT ISSUED BY THE AIR SAFETY INSTITUTE

With hypoxia a potential factor in two recent high-profile incidents of unresponsive pilots, the AOPA Air Safety Institute has issued a safety alert reminding pilots of the typical symptoms of hypoxia, outlining strategies for detecting and communicating a hypoxia emergency, and providing further resources.

The two tragic accidents that occurred within a week of each other, one Aug. 30 and the other Sept. 5, involved pilot incapacitation at high altitudes. While it's impossible to say for certain that hypoxia was the primary cause, the flight profiles and reports from the military pilots who intercepted the aircraft point toward this as a possibility. As a quick reminder, here are some of the typical symptoms of hypoxia:

- Cyanosis (blue fingernails and lips)
- Headache
- Hot flashes or a feeling of warmth
- Decreased cognitive abilities
- Impaired judgment
- Euphoria

- Visual impairment, reduced visual acuity
- Tunnel vision
- Drowsiness
- Lightheadedness or dizzy sensation
- Tingling in fingers and toes
- Numbness

Even though these are the most common symptoms of hypoxia, each pilot's physiological responses are unique. With the insidious nature of hypoxia and the resulting loss of cognitive abilities, it quickly becomes difficult to recognize the symptoms in time to take prompt action and mitigate the risks of becoming incapacitated while flying. The good news is that general aviation pilots have a powerful, low-cost tool available to them to help avoid succumbing to the effects of hypoxia. A **pulse oximeter** is the best defense against hypoxia and can be purchased from a variety of aviation vendors or any drug store.

When flying an unpressurized aircraft pilots should check their oxygen saturation levels regularly (about every 10 to 15 minutes). In a pressurized aircraft, the first step should be using supplemental oxygen if hypoxia or cabin pressurization problems are suspected. Once on supplemental oxygen, pilots can use a pulse oximeter to monitor their oxygen saturation levels. In either case, cabin pressurization problems and hypoxia are serious emergencies. Communicating this to ATC and the use of supplemental oxygen, if available, are imperative.

It is also important to remember that each pilot's ability to maintain adequate oxygen levels will be slightly different based on a variety of health and lifestyle factors. In general, if the pulse oximeter shows 90 percent or above blood oxygen saturation, the pilot's brain should be receiving enough oxygen to function normally. Below 90 percent, mental function begins to deteriorate, and the pilot should use supplemental oxygen or descend to a lower altitude until oxygen saturation levels increase back to normal.

Bottom line: If you fly regularly above 10,000 feet msl, a pulse oximeter should be part of your pilot equipment, and you should check your oxygen saturation levels regularly during the fight. If you'd like to read more about hypoxia, here are links that go into greater detail:

NTSB SAFETY ALERT SA-026 — ALL SECURE, ALL CLEAR

Be vigilant regarding accountability and security of items. The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) recently published a safety advisory to remind pilots that forgotten and unsecured items within an aircraft can lead to accidents or incidents as they move during flight. These items can include aviation-related items such as GPS units, clipboards, and antennas; nonaviation-related portable electronic devices (PED) such as personal phones and computers; and personal items such as jackets or carry-on items.

Located halfway between Williams, Arizona and the south rim of the Grand Canyon, this facility houses over 40 of the Museum's aircraft, many of which are also flyable. Our mission is to preserve aviation history, inspire interest in aviation, educate the public, and honor aviation pioneers and veterans. The Museum is dedicated to the preservation, perpetuation and exhibition of historical aircraft, and to the men and women, both famous and unknown, who devoted their lives to flight."

SEPTEMBER 11 IS PATRIOT DAY!

Patriot Day observed as the National Day of Service and Remembrance, occurs on September 11 of each year in memory of the 2,977 killed in the 2001 September 11 attacks. The flag of the United States is flown at half-staff at the White House and on all U.S. government buildings and establishments throughout the world; flags are also encouraged to be displayed on individual American homes. Additionally, a moment of silence is observed to correspond with the attacks, beginning at 8:46 AM (Eastern Daylight Time), the time the first plane, American Airlines Flight 11, struck the North Tower of the World Trade Center on September 11, 2001.

Patriot Day is not a federal holiday; schools and businesses remain open in observance of the occasion, although memorial ceremonies for the victims are often held.

FLIGHT TRAINING SCHOLARSHIPS AVAILABLE

The air racing team known as the Racing Aces has created a \$5,000 scholarship for women seeking flight training or other kinds of aviation training or education. The Racing Aces—Dianna Stanger, Joyce Wilson, and Erin Cude—took the top prize in the 2014 Air Race Classic women's air race. The team said it is funding the new scholarship with winnings and sponsorships to underwrite aviation education for women. Qualified applicants should be planning a career in any area of aviation, and must be accepted and enrolled full-time in an accredited U.S. college or university, or enrolled in a flight school. The American Association of Airport Executives (AAAE) has announced that it will award more than \$156,000 in scholarships to 114 students during the 2014-2015 academic year.
