WHAT'S UP? SAY IT ISN'T SO!


The Airport/Facility Directory (A/FD), published every 56 days, is the best pound-for-pound deal in aviation. However, a recent minor change may lead to major headaches.

While reviewing the current revision of the A/FD, we found that the following text has been omitted:

New or Changed Information—To alert users of new information or changes to information from the previous issue, a vertical line will be portrayed in the outside margin and extending the full length of the new and/or revised data. This will not apply to the front cover or the airport/facility directory listing.

Without change bars in the Airport/Facilities Directory, not only will it be a challenge to determine when data has been revised — it will be nearly impossible to ascertain when new data is added.

In lieu of the change bars, at a minimum, each page of the Airport/Facilities Directory should have the latest revision date. Precedence for this process can be found on the Airport Diagrams within the Airport/Facilities Directory. The format for the chart revision date is 5 digits; the first two indicate the year of the revision and the last three indicate the Julian date (001 to 365/366).



Date of Latest Revision

The Date of Latest Revision identifies the Julian date the chart was added or last revised for any reason. The first two digits indicate the year, the last three digits indicate the day of the year (001 to 365/6) in which the latest revision of any kind has been made to the chart.

LESSONS LEARNED

Good news! Harrison Ford has been released from UCLA Medical Center, just one month after his emergency landing at the golf course off the departure end of Runway 21 at Santa Monica Airport. The successful outcome of the mechanical failure of his engine bears review so that others can have successful outcomes too:

He knew himself Striving to meet or exceed excellence in our professional flying skills is an on-going mission. A proficient pilot is a confident pilot. Engine failure is not the time to wonder if a turn at glide speed is beyond the pilot skill level. Practice best glide, forward and side slips, simulated engine failures and "the impossible turn" back to the airport. Set a goal to maintain passenger currency and, if that lapses, grab an instructor. But don't confuse currency with proficiency. Currency just means having flown recently. Proficiency has more to do with the pilot's attitude while he's in the cockpit. You should actually start thinking about the cockpit and flying before you get into your car to go to the airport. Think airplane during the drive out and things will go much smoother once you get there.

He knew his aircraft Although rumor has it he had only 300' altitude, Ford knew what his aircraft could do and he successfully executed the turn back to the airport. Put together a checklist in your mind of every phase of flight including, takeoff, climb-out, pattern legs and landing. Look up the right speeds for your airplane, the most important being the Best Rate of Climb and the Best Glide. Review the operating manual so you know flap and gear speeds as well as stall speeds in different configurations and weights.

He had a plan Visualize "what if" scenarios for your entire route. Plan for the worst. Have a plan — including an escape or diversion plan — for every flight that involves possible encounters with adverse weather. Planning a safe route around and through complex airspace includes alternative routing if conditions don't cooperate with your original flight plan. Plan always to Avigate, navigate, communicate — in that order. Hangar flying with fellow pilots is a great way to develop a plan given different scenarios. Practice makes perfect – even for non-celebrity pilots.

GO SMO!

The golf course, which lies just outside the Santa Monica city limits, is generally considered the best option when problems develop on takeoff with insufficient altitude to be able to return safely to the airport.

SMO is attractive to the Hollywood elite because of its location and creates 1,500 jobs and brings \$245 million per year in business to the local community. However, gentrification has transformed local thinking. It has become an object of fury for local residents and for local politicians who see it as an eyesore and an obstacle to more sustainable forms of urban planning.

To help support SMO, check out santamonicaairport.com, a website operated by non-pilot residents of Santa Monica. Their events have inspired over 1,700 kids in the surrounding neighborhoods by hosting kid-friendly events at the airport.

LGB REISSUING AOA BADGES

April 30th will be the last day that yellow LGB badges will be acceptable on the airport. From a notice dated March 18, 2015 from the LGB Airport Department:

Due to the high volume of unaccounted Airport AOA badges, it has become necessary to replace the current Airport AOA badge with one of a different and unique design. New badges are currently available from Airport access control. All previously issued yellow AOA badges must be replaced with the new design by April 30, 2015. During this transition time, both the newly designed blue AOA badges and the old yellow AOA badges will be accepted at our Airport. After April 30, all old AOA badges will no longer be accepted at the Long Beach Airport.

Pilots should pick up a new badge application from the club to take to the badging office. Present it with your old badge along with your personal ID to Airport access control in order to receive a new Long Beach AOA badge. Make sure to check that the access control office is open — their hours are irregular — before making the 4.3 mile round trip from the club. Also, allocate plenty of time to wait in line — there is only one person issuing the new badges.

HUGE TURNOUT "RUNS THE RUNWAY" from LGB Press Release

It had been 22 years since the public was invited onto a runway at Long Beach Airport, and they certainly made the most of the opportunity. On Tuesday afternoon, more than 1,400 people attended a "Run The Runway" event at LGB to welcome the reopening of Runway 7L-25R and participate in a one-mile fun run.

Some participants ran like the wind and completed the mile in just around six minutes. Most people, however, took their time and enjoyed the sights and sounds of being on a runway while flights continued to operate around other areas of the airport. After all, there was a lot to see. Long Beach Fire Department Station 16 brought their emergency truck, the Los Angeles County Sheriff's Department brought a helicopter, Catalina Flying Boats brought their historic DC-3 and several small general aviation aircraft were also on display. If there was ever an event to inspire a future generation of pilots, it was Run the Runway at LGB.

Local elected officials also turned out to celebrate the event. Long Beach City Councilmembers included Al Austin, Roberto Uranga and Stacy Mungo. Lakewood Mayor Jeff Wood also attended, and Long Beach Mayor Robert Garcia cut the ribbon to officially mark the opening of 25R. The most coveted job of all, though, went to Long Beach Airport Director Bryant L. Francis, who waved a giant orange-checkered flag to mark the official start of the fun run.

If that wasn't enough, local favorites MOVE brought the jams with performances before and after the run. Meanwhile, the Van Leeuwen Ice Cream truck offered delicious artisan treats. It was truly an all-encompassing event, made even better thanks to the enormous crowd and their excitement and enthusiasm.
